
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# **A History of Supporting Community**

- Advance medical or health knowledge.
- Relieve or reduce the burden of government or other community health efforts.



# Community Health Improvement

Arkansas Children's invests in community health improvement programs aimed at addressing the identified health needs outlined in the 2022 ACNW CHNA through a collaborative, partnership-based approach.

# **Community Health Promotion for a Safer Tomorrow**

Delivering care to children where they learn and grow helps keep children in school, caregivers at work and children happier and healthier. In FY24, the ACNW Primary Care Clinic held a vaccination event at a high-need local school, helping 56 students catch up on immunizations with 127 Vaccines for Children (VFC) stock vaccines.

Injury prevention efforts at ACNW focus on making Arkansas a healthier and safer place for children. In FY24, we educated medical personnel in emergency burn management, trained community members as Child Passenger Safety Technicians (CPSTs), certified babysitters through Safe Sitter® and taught parents about safe sleep and infant safety.

# **Supporting Culturally Sensitive Care**

Northwest Arkansas has a diverse patient population, including many non-English speaking families. To provide culturally sensitive care, our 12 on-site interpreters assist patients beyond accreditation requirements, which is especially important for the Marshallese and Hispanic communities served at ACNW.
